### ADS 215 Ethical and Legal Issues in the Substance Abuse Profession

This course details guidelines individuals seeking addiction treatment. Therefore, specific codes of ethics, as well as state and federal laws, have been developed to guide addiction professionals in their delivery of professional care to individuals seeking their services. This course details the guidelines of ethics, confidentiality, and boundaries for substance abuse counselors from several resources specific to alcohol and drug counselors. This course also reviews the most essential and universal principles of health care ethics, while highlighting how to effectively resolve the ethical dilemmas that may arise while delivering care to individuals in need.

# ADS 220 Alcohol and Drug Helping Skills

Introduce the student to multicultural counseling skills and theory. The course will help in the development of basic communication and individual helping skills appropriate in the dynamics of dealing with abusers of alcohol and other drugs.

# **ADS 222 Alcohol and Drug Group Interactions**

Introduces basic dynamic of counseling group interaction theory. The student will develop facilitative skills directed toward working with groups in the management of alcohol and drug abuse.

#### **ADS 223 Alcohol and Drug Treatment Continuum**

This course emphasizes continuum of addiction treatment care.

#### **PSYC 100 Human Relations in Organizations**

This course focuses on building successful and effective interpersonal relationships within organizational and other social environments.

#### **PSYC 105 Relationships and Self-Esteem**

This course discusses career options, financial budgeting, interpersonal communication, family relations, and parenting skills. Emphasis is on self-esteem and motivational techniques to achieve personal goals.

#### **PSYC 103 Additions and Alternatives**

Introduction to additions, addictive behaviors, and the physical, mental, and emotional effects on the individual and the family. Topics include theoretical perspectives on abuse, pharmacological characteristics of commonly abused substances, and stages of dependence and addiction. Alternative healthy behaviors and lifestyle choices will also be emphasized.

### **PSYC 111 Introduction to Psychology**

A survey of the scientific study of behavior and mental processes.

#### **PSYC 112 Foundations of Psychology**

This course focuses on the tools necessary to advance in the social sciences and focuses on building foundational skills, knowledge, and awareness of research practices.

### **PSYC 210 Child Development**

An introduction to the emotional, intellectual, physical, perceptual, and social development of the child from conception to adolescence. The relationship between development and parenting also will be explored.

#### **PSYC 211 Introduction to Behavior Modification**

This course studies the history of behaviorism and introduces the principles and applications of behavior modification.

# **PSYC 230 Educational Psychology**

This course focuses on current psychological principles as they apply to teaching and learning.

### **PSYC 240 Industrial/Organizational Psychology**

An introduction to the application of the principles and methods of psychology to the workplace. Specific topics include employee selection, training, organizational behavior, leadership, conflict and cooperation, motivation, job satisfaction and morale, performance appraisal, and stress in the workplace.

# **PSYC 250 Developmental Psychology**

A survey of the psychology of human life span development.

#### PSYC 252/352 Child Psychology

A survey of human development from conception through childhood.

### **PSYC 253 Adolescent Psychology**

A study of human development during adolescence.

#### **PSYC 255 Child & Adolescent Psychology**

Overview of theories of human psychological development from conception through adolescence.

#### **PSYC 258 Adult & End of Life Psychology**

Examines the cognitive, physical, and psychological changes that take place from early adulthood through late adulthood. Emphasis is placed on the description and explanation of the dimensions of developmental change and tasks associated with the adult development period.

### **PSYC 261 Psychology of Adjustment**

This course focuses on the application of psychological principles to the enhancement of personal and social adjustment.

### PSYC 270/370 Abnormal Psychology

A survey of the classification, symptoms, and etiology of psychological disorders.

### **PSYC 276 Social Psychology**

This course provides an interdisciplinary approach to the study of individual behavior in its social context. Prerequisite: PSYC 111.

# PSYC 280/380 Introduction to Health Psychology

Describes the interaction of psychology and health, including the ways in which thoughts, emotions, and behavior influence one's health.

### **PSYC 353 Adolescent Psychology**

A study of human development during adolescence. Special attention given to young adolescent needs and implications for educational practice in the middle grades. Prerequisite: PSYC 111.
